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A MESSAGE FROM FEEDING NEW YORK A new year of possibilities & initiatives



There's an old story from many years ago, when anthropologist Margaret Mead was asked what she considered to be the first sign of civilization in a prehistoric culture. Most of us would think of things like tools, or cave art or something like that. Mead's answer was none of these - she said that the first sign of civilization in an ancient culture was a leg bone that had broken, but had healed. Mead's point was that a healed bone is evidence that the group took risks and expended effort to help a person recover, rather than leaving them to their fate. Helping members of the community through difficulty, even when it costs us work and risk, is where civilization starts.

I wonder sometimes if in 2023 we can pass Dr. Mead's civilization test. We probably all want to live in a society in which we help each other, and can depend on others to help us if we need it. But do we? I wonder. Our national political culture seems to be content to leave people to their fate, no matter what difficulties we have put them through.

We can do better.

Over the last four decades, food banks and other similar organizations have been doing much of the 'helping work' upon which civilization depends. We at Feeding NYS are proud to be members of this community. However, our challenge is not simply to do this work better, but to change the national political culture so that we are all helping each other and no one is left behind.

Advocacy Updates LOOKING TO 2023

Following an impactful year of advocacy in 2022 - which included

- a 63% HPNAP funding increase,
- the codification of Nourish New York as a permanent budget line,
- and the first White House Conference on Hunger, Nutrition, and Health in over
 50 years

Feeding New York State will have significant advocacy opportunities at the state and federal level.

At the state level, there is growing momentum for New York to join other states – California, Maine, Colorado, Vermont, and Massachusetts – in guaranteeing healthy school meals for all students. Feeding New York State is proud to work alongside a diverse coalition of education, anti-hunger, and public health advocates on this initiative. Additional state-level priorities for 2023 include increased funding for HPNAP and Nourish New York and continued public investment in SNAP outreach and enrollment.

The new year ushers in a new Congress that will work on the 2023 Farm Bill. The Farm Bill is an omnibus legislative piece that is negotiated every five years and carries major implications for nutrition and agriculture policy. Feeding New York State will advocate for a Farm Bill that strengthens the benefit adequacy of and expands eligibility for SNAP, affirms TEFAP as a lifeline for the millions of Americans experiencing hunger and food insecurity, and invests in grant programs that improve nutrition security and strengthen local food systems.

Looking ahead to 2023, Feeding New York State will continue our work guided by the understanding that healthy food is a human right. We look forward to another robust year full of legislative wins, coalition building, and organizing on behalf of a hunger-free New York.

Community Highlight VENISON PROGRAM

The Venison Donation Program has been in existence in New York since the late 1990's. What started as a regional way for successful hunters to help those in need has grown to include almost every region across the state.

Every year close to 38 tons of venison is donated. One pound of ground venison equates to about four meals. Since its inception, the program has helped distribute over five million meals to neighbors in need.

One of the program's early success stories occurred shortly after the 9/11 tragedy. The Food Bank of NYC was seriously low on meat to hand out. A group of Lower Hudson Valley hunters, with others, helped coordinate the delivery of 2,000 pounds of uncut venison. **These individuals cut, ground up and packaged all the venison in one night.** The following morning, they delivered the venison to the Food Bank in Hunts Point and the Bronx, thereby helping to alleviate the shortage.

Venison is a high protein, low fat meat that is also high in B vitamins and amino acids. It is the ideal meat for those who need to eat healthy and is organic to boot. When mixed with beans, rice or vegetables, venison helps to make a perfectly balanced meal.

If a hunter successfully harvests a deer, they need only to find a participating processor and drop off the deer. The hunter does not pay anything, and the food banks reimburse the processor for the processed meat.

In NYS, a hunter in most areas can legally harvest up to nine deer. For those who are successful in harvesting more than they need, there is no better way to help than to donate the excess to the food banks.

Hi, I'm Danielle Vasquez! In June 2022, I began my journey with Feeding Westchester as the Food Donations Coordinator. In my role, I have responsibilities that include quarterly site visits and regular food safety training sessions with each retail partner and their teams.

I have been told that I have become a friendly and familiar face for our retail partners. My regular visits with stores have increased the variety, quality and quantity of donations rescued.

My role has been instrumental in the launch of the Agency Enablement Program, which has resulted in an 18% increase in retail donations since the start of this fiscal year, and continues in an upward trajectory. Feeding Westchester has been able to transition 47 of our weekly pickups over to agency partners. This approach has reduced our food bank fleet pickup schedule, effectively allowing us to onboard 8 new retail partners this fiscal year to date. Our greatest successes have been within Stop & Shop, BJ's, Target, Costco and GoPuff stores.
